Shooting sensation

Amber Rutter (née Hill)
gave birth to her son
Tommy just over three

will be representing
ParalympicsGB having
taken a 20-month hiatus
for the birth of her
son Joshua.

Table tennis sensation **Bly Twomey** is set to compete at her debut Paralympic Games having only turned 14-years-old in April. European bronze medallist Bly, who benefitted from Backing The Best support in 2023, was born with cerebral palsy and is currently ranked fifth in the world.

Three sets of SportsAid siblings will be representing Team GB.... Laviai and Lina Nielsen (athletics), Emily and Tom Ford (rowing) and Joe and Max Litchfield (swimming).

Tom Pidcock has been selected to represent Team GB in mountain biking and the road race. He will compete in the mountain biking on 28-29 July then switch to the road race on 3 August.

Boxer Chantelle Reid. cyclist **Fred Wright** and track and field athlete Laviai Nielsen all featured in SportsAid's aroundbreaking #SupportTheNext film which helped to launch the charity's 40th anniversary year back in 2016. They were current beneficiaries at the time and featured alongside members of alumni such as Beckv Adlington. Ellie Simmonds. **Katherine Grainger** and Sarah Storey.

ParalympicsGB's whole wheelchair tennis team have been supported by SportsAid during their careers with Lucy Shaker (2005) being the first and Ben Bartram and Dahnon Ward (2018 and 2019) being the latest. Alfie Hewett, Andy Lapthorne and Gordon Reid are the remaining three.

Toby Roberts, who was supported by SportsAid in 2019 and 2021, is the first-ever male climber

to qualify for an Olympic Games. The 19-year-old secured his place with victory at the European qualifiers in 2023 and has since been joined by fellow alumni Hamish McArthur and Molly Thompson-Smith.

Team GB artistic swimmers **Izzv Thorpe** and Katy Shortman both received several vears of SportsAid support with their latest awards coming in 2017. Every single member of the badminton, canoe slalom, golf, judo, marathon swimming. table tennis, triathlon and weightlifting squads for Team GB have been previous beneficiaries of the charity. Skateboarding is the only sport Team GB has qualified for at the Olympics which doesn't feature a member of SportsAid's alumni.

Many Olympians and Paralympians will be appearing across your TV screens live from Paris as presenters, studio guests, commentators and reporters for the BBC, Channel 4 and Eurosport. The majority of them received help from SportsAid when they were younger including Ade Adepitan, Jessica Ennis-Hill, Laura Kenny, Moe Sbihi and Tanni Grey-Thompson.





The Talented Athlete Scholarship Scheme (TASS) is managed by SportsAid on behalf of Sport England. The programme helps athletes aged 16-plus to balance sport within the rest of their lives; be that in education, training or another form of personal development.

TASS has distributed over £40 million

towards athletes and their support networks since the first awards were made in 2004

104 athletes previously supported by TASS have been announced

so far to represent Great Britain at the Olympics and Paralympics in Paris

TASS athletes won 66 medals at Tokyo 2020

as they returned 15 gold, 22 silver and 29 bronze
